Sally was the wife of Thomas "Tom" Gerald Liddick who she married on September 3, 1966.

Sally graduated from Camp Hill High School as part of the class of 1964 and attended Harrisburg Area Community College. She was the founder and President of *Barkleigh Productions, Inc.* based in Mechanicsburg and owner of two professional pet service magazines: *Groomer to Groomer* and *Pet Boarding & Daycare. Barkleigh* also operates the largest pet care services show in the world, *Groom Expo*, and other major industry shows: *Groom & Kennel Expo*, *PetQuest* and the *Northwest Grooming Show*.

Sally was the recipient of four *Cardinal Crystal Achievement Awards* for *Journalist of the Year* and won the *Dog Writers Association of America Grooming Journalist Award*. She was a professional pet groomer for fifteen years and the daughter of a groomer. She is the author of a book entitled *Taking a Different Path*. Her business has been featured on *TLC* with a program called *Extreme Poodles*, and her events have been seen on numerous television programs and national magazines including *People*, *The Today Show*, *Regis and Kelly*, *The Insider* and more. She wrote for her various magazines and had a column called, *THE LAST WORD*, in *Groomer to Groomer*.

Sally was extremely creative, very talented and enormously generous. She was a tough and driven woman who strove for perfection, otherwise known as "Sally's Way," and expected no less from those around her. Sally was a Christian and True Believer. She was a loving, devoted and loyal wife to Tom and best friend to Gwen Shelly.

Sally's survivors include her loving husband of 45 years: Thomas "Tom" Gerald Liddick; her son: Thomas Gerald Liddick Jr and his wife Kimberly and their children Nathan, Isaiah and Rachael all of Grove City PA; her best friend and business partner: Gwen Shelly and her husband Bruce of Mechanicsburg; her caregiver: Ashley Sultzaberger; three nieces and one nephew. Among those preceding Sally in death is her sister: Kathleen Breach.

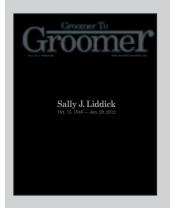

Sally never had a plan or a roadmap. She did things the "Sally Way" while making her own path. Her goals were simple. She wanted to help provide for her family by promoting the industry she loved while using the morals that went along with her Christian values.

Looking around that day and seeing what she grew from such a small and humble beginning, I couldn't help but feel a little in awe of it all. She was a woman who just wanted to do her part to help others. I'd say she overshot a bit. For that, we are grateful.

She is also a Newfoundland.

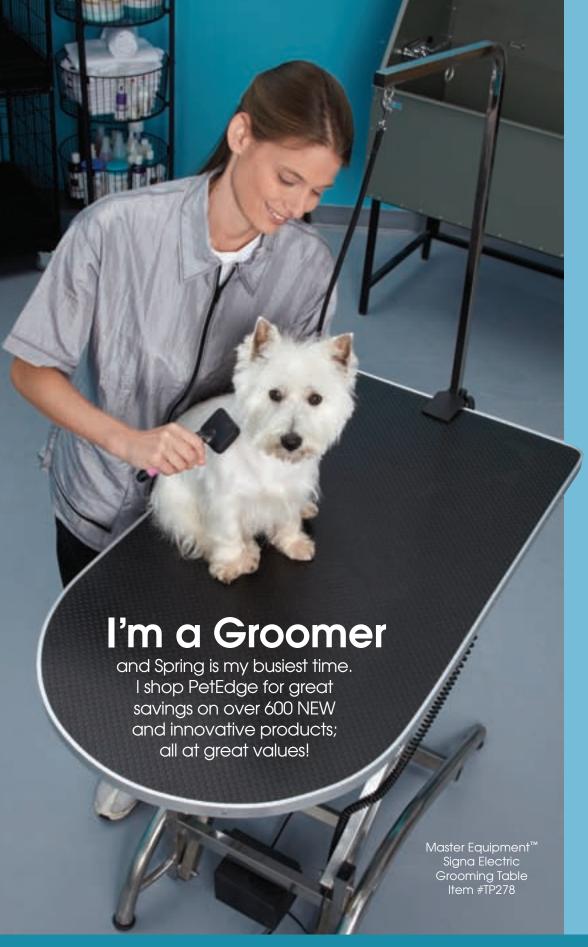

hurts! You just want to go curl up in a ball and hide somewhere. The other groomers are looking at you and wondering what's up with you.

An hour or so later, your mouth feels cold, and when you check it out in the bathroom mirror, your gums are now blue. You feel weak. Your heart is racing. You collapse, and your co-workers call 911, but it's too late. You just died.

That's what bloat does to a dog.

What Is Bloat?

Bloat, or torsion or gastric dilatation-volvulus (GDV), is when the stomach of a dog twists on itself, cutting off the esophagus at one end and all the organs south of the stomach at the other end. There is no longer blood flow to any of the organs, which caused them to shut down. Toxins and gas build up in the stomach. Shock occurs quickly,

and the stomach may rupture. If it ruptures, it causes peristalsis. Peristalsis is an inflammation of the membrane that lines the stomach. On its own, peristalsis is life threatening.

> foundlands, Old English Sheepdogs, Rottweilers, Samoyeds, St. Bernards, and Weimaraners.

That's not to say small dogs with deep chests aren't vulnerable. Dachshunds, Pekinese, and Miniature Poodles have been known to bloat.

What Are the Causes of Bloat?

There are three categories of causes: genetics, anatomy, and environment. The first is genetics. There are breeds that are pre-disposed, especially if a close family member has bloated or has

untreated exocrine pancreatic insufficiency. The second is anatomy. Dogs with the highest risk tend to be older, are predominately male, mainly underweight, and have deep chests. And last are environmental factors. Dogs that drink or eat quickly and excessively, especially in combination with activity, are most susceptible. Stress, such as a dog may experience

at the groomer, can escalate a dog already pre-disposed to bloat.

One, all, or a combination of any of the factors can induce bloat.

What Are the Signs of Bloat?

The signs will vary from dog to dog, but may include the following:

- 1. Many unproductive attempts to vomit. It could be foamy or full of mucous. They may drool. (The esophagus is blocked off.)
- 2. They are not their usual selves and are restless and anxious. They are pacing and whining. (*They know something is wrong.*)
- 3. They cannot sit or lie down. (*Their stomach is distended.*)
- 4. They hunch up their backs. (They are trying to relieve some of the internal pressure.)
- 5. Their stomach is hard and distended. (It is filling up with gas and toxins.)
- 6. Their gums will go from bright red (shock) to pale blue (hypoxic), and their gums will feel cold.
- 7. They try, unsuccessfully, to defecate. (Everything south of the stomach is blocked off.)
- 8. They lick the air. (Dogs lick the air when they are trying to get

rid of something internally.)

- 9. They try to hide. (When dogs are dying, it is a natural response to go off by themselves.)
- 10. They glance over at their side or stomach. (This is where the pain is.)
- 11. They go from heavy panting to shallow breathing. (The organs are shutting down.)
- 12. They look weak and have a weak pulse. (No blood flow. The *heart is shutting down.)*
- 13. Collapse. (Organs have shut down. Death will follow shortly.)

What to Do If You Suspect Bloat?

Contact your veterinarian first and then transport immediately. Do not try to treat this on your own unless your veterinarian has trained you. Time is of the essence here. Death can occur in a couple of hours. During my research, Mylanta was mentioned as a way to buy time. I questioned my vet about this, and she responded, "Using Mylanta on a bloating dog is like putting a Band-Aid on a chainsaw injury. Use your time more effectively by calling us so we can prepare for your arrival."

Being familiar with the causes and recognizing the early signs, along with prompt veterinarian treatment, are your best defenses against bloat.

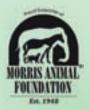
"Mirror, Mirror, on the Wall"

This got me thinking, and I went searching for more examples of this phenomenon. Again, I have boys, so this behavior is foreign to me. I began watching people, usually at the best place ever to watch people... THE MALL! I watched the "mallers," as I call them, walk in front of windows and turn to look at themselves, smiling and tilting their heads. I even saw a few guys suck in their gut and pretend they were thinner.

I've watched people try on hats, scarves, necklaces, glasses, etc. and frantically search for a mirror to see how they looked in their new garb. We tend to like the way this extra "flair" makes us look, enhancing our other characteristics, body shape, clothing, etc. For whatever reason, we are attracted to the attractive, interested in the interesting, and jealous of the zealous. This extra flair seems to help bridge the gap between personality

and appearance.

What does this have to do with pet grooming?! A lot! Allow me to explain my take on this.

Since I have been involved in the pet industry my entire working life, you would think I would be immune to the appeal of an expertly trained dog or blind to the magnificence of a professionally groomed dog. However, no matter how many I have seen, I am still attracted to each. If after 26 years I am still in awe of these accomplishments, I believe our customers are even more excited when they see similar examples of perfection.

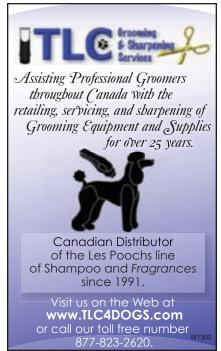
While you sharpen your grooming skills in the pursuit of perfection, there are some things you can do to help "bridge the gap" between the pet's characteristics (body shape, coat type and density, color, etc.) and the personality each pet has. It's all about the "mirror factor." If the pet were human, what

would get it to look at itself in the mirror like the "mallers" do? Since it's not human, what will get other people to look at this pet and ask the pet parent, "Where do you get your dog groomed?" Business 101: word of mouth advertising (referrals) is a leader in the way we get new clients; give them something to talk about! Add some flair to your grooming.

To know the pet's personality type, you need to get to know the pet and the pet parent. Too many times, we make the mistake of viewing the pets as just appointments instead of individuals. Although you may see dozens of pets each

day, the customer only sees ONE. Don't forget this! To really make an impact on the relationship depth between you and the pet parent, show an interest in the person and their pet, getting to know both of them on a personal level. Once you tap into this level, your opportunities to "wow" them are endless.

Flair can take on many forms. Here are some I have seen, though I am sure there are many more out there if you go looking for them.

Bows

When I was first introduced to the grooming business, one of the very first lessons I was taught was how to make a bow. Yep, those little orthodontic rubber bands, colorful ribbon, and hemostats... All were my nemesis. Some fingers are just too big to make this task easy. Mine sure are. Anyway, I learned simple bow making and how to put them in the pet's hair. Some pros use hot glue guns to affix extra items like pom poms, plastic spiders at Halloween, tassels, etc. to the basic bow.

Bandanas

There is some really cool material out there that you can use to cut your own bandanas. What some have done with vibrant fabric and a pair of pinking shears is amazing. I have seen bandanas around necks, around waists, used as leggings, and even as leash or collar wraps. I have even seen some groomers provide matching bandanas to the children in the pet's family so everyone matches for pictures or visiting family.

Color

Stencils and body/coat coloring is a unique way to alter a pet's look temporarily, especially for special occasions like weddings, parties, holidays, etc. Add glitter or stickers and you have just transformed ordinary to extraordinary.

Themes

I once saw groomers decorating their groomed pets using color schemes that matched the pet parent's favorite team, wedding colors, and other special occasions. You could even have special "theme days" where you promote this free flair service. I tend to lean toward the surprise factor whenever possible. Pay attention, as customers will often give you clues to what really moves them, and you can use this to make a big impact! Even those macho men who insist on no bows, etc. are impressed by their team colors made into a braided collar for the big game weekend.

I am certain there are plenty more creative ideas floating around out there for you to take full advantage of, but whatever you do, try to make the flair centered around the customer's interests and not just the first ribbon or fabric you see.

Take a lesson from my niece. People like looking at themselves, and people like their pets looking like them!

Essential Oils in the Grooming Salon

Part 2

ow might a groomer use aromatherapy? Essential oils can be diffused in a grooming salon to deodorize and sanitize the air. Used solely for fragrance, an essential blend can create an aromatic signature for your workplace. At the table, oils

can be used to uplift, calm, or help you recover from stress or upset. Aromatherapy can also be used to help calm the dogs. Essential oils can be added to a shampoo or conditioner base to help with skin and coat health or can be applied in a carrier oil as a special spa conditioning treatment.

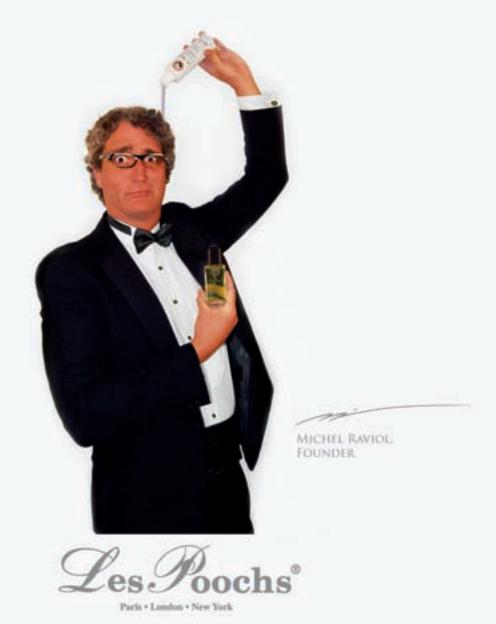
Deodorize and Sanitize

Lemon oil is an excellent sanitizer for the workplace, as it is strongly antiseptic and antibacterial. It can be blended with tea tree oil or ravensara, which are powerful anti-virals, and lavender, another good bactericide, which also seems to enhance the therapeutic effects of oils in its company. Citrus oils, such as lime, lemon, bergamot, grapefruit, and orange, are particularly effective at cutting across the odor "values" of musty, wet dogs or the other pet odors that can occasion-

Fragrance Statement

Essential oils can be used singly or blended for fragrance value, which can be used in your waiting area or doorway to establish a fragrance "identity" for your salon. The clever groomer can even include something in her or his blend that will have calming and balancing effects on the clients. There are many types of aromatherapy diffusers available. One type that works well in a grooming salon is an ultrasonic diffuser that uses water and ultrasonic vibrations to create a fine mist. In aromatherapy, the finer the droplets that are diffused, the greater the effect of the aromatic oil.

At the Table

Certain oils can be diffused in your personal space to help you be less anxious over your work (lavender and geranium), less distressed (orange and ylang-ylang), and even to control anger (lavender, neroli, and rose). Peppermint, lemon, and basil are great energizers for that late afternoon slump. There are blends that help with focus and

concentration (clary sage, pink grapefruit, and lemongrass) and fragrances to help with different kinds of headaches (spearmint).

Calming the Dogs

Lavender is the most commonly used essential oil for helping to calm animals. Basil has been used for dogs with separation or other anxiety, and sweet marjoram is used in calming blends for animals. Ylangylang and cedarwood also have a sedative effect. Petitgrain (Citrus aurantium) is effective to reduce anxiety and calm animals. Essential oils should never be applied full strength (neat) to dogs. An easy way to get dogs to inhale the aromatics is to apply them to a piece of paper towel clamped to a kennel door or to your grooming arm at the table. A few drops of an oil or a blend on a bandana is another means. Some calming products are available in direct sprays that can be spritzed safely on the dog.

Blending Tips

It is a good idea to become thoroughly familiar with your essential oils singly before you begin mixing and blending. Essential oils are often blended with regard to fragrance "notes" or evaporation rates in order to create a balanced fragrance. Top notes evaporate first, middle notes form the body of a fragrance, and base notes linger. Aromatherapy blends usually contain three to five oils. Blend more than that, and you risk creating aromatherapy "mud" with chemical components canceling each other out rather than synergizing. Some oils, such as eucalyptus and peppermint, are very dominant in a blend and do best in smaller amounts. It is wise to create a blend that adds up to ten drops. This makes it easier to multiply once you get the proportions to your liking. For example, you could try five drops of orange, three drops of lavender, and two drops of ylangylang. The drops could then easily

be converted to milliliters.

These essential oils are safe for use with animals and are affordable as a starting place for aromatherapy in the grooming salon. Fragrance notes (top, middle, or base) are identified for blending purposes.

• LAVENDER (Lavandula angustifolia) Middle Note -Lavender is on everyone's Top Ten list. It has multiple properties and is great for

both pets and people. It is soothing to the emotions as well as to the skin. It blends well with other oils, especially citrus and other flower oils, contributing softness to the fragrance. Lavender enhances the therapeutic effects of other oils in a blend.

- **LEMON** (Citrus limonum) Top Note – Known as a "purifying" oil, lemon has outstanding antiseptic effects and is emotionally uplifting. A blend of six drops of lemon oil and four drops of tea tree oil is quite sanitizing as well as fresh smelling. Lemon fragrance is particularly suited for counteracting pet odor.
- LEMON EUCALYPTUS
 (Eucalyptuscitriodora)
 Top Note This variety of
 eucalyptus is antibacterial,
 antiviral, and antifungal and
 has been determined to be
 a very effective insect
 repellant. It blends well

with lavender, tea tree, and

lemon oils but will dominate

- a blend. It is not as pungent as ordinary eucalyptus.
- TEA TREE (Melaleuca alternifolia) Middle Note It enhances immune function and is the strongest agent against bacteria, fungi, and viruses. One of the most studied of the essential oils, it blends well with lavender or lemon.
- CLARY SAGE (Salvia sclarea)
 Middle Note An excellent
 addition to any calming blend
 for animals, it is both uplifting
 and mildly sedating. In
 humans, it is an antidepressant and opens the
 mind. Clary calms tension,
 reduces stress response, and
 blends well with lavender or
 sweet orange.
- **PEPPERMINT** (Mentha piperita) or spearmint (Mentha spicata) Middle to Top Notes Both of these are uplifting and energizing oils. Spearmint is less strong. Both blend with lemon, tea tree, or layender.

Note - An effective antidepressant and anxiety reducer, ylang-ylang is also established as being effective in reducing high blood pressure and tachycardia. It was used in a highly popular hair treatment of the 19th Century, Macassar oil.

ATLAS CEDARWOOD

(Cedrus atlantica) Base Note – An excellent pest repellant that also tones skin, it is antiseborrheic and antifungal. Cedarwood is a good deodorant and blends well with lavender, clary sage, and ylang-ylang.

ROSE GERANIUM

(Pelargonium graveolens) Middle to Top Note

- Known as a balancing oil for either stormy emotions or raging hormones, geranium is also an effective antifungal agent, used in some preparations for pet ear problems. It reduces anxiety, especially when blended with lavender.

Blending of essential oils and the practice of aromatherapy is both an art and a science. As an art, it relies on intuition and a good nose, just as grooming relies on a sense of style and a good eye. As a science, the practice of aromatherapy involves the study of the properties and chemistry of the essential oils. The master aromatherapist knows the profiles of each oil, just as the master groomer knows the breed profiles of the dogs on the table. Aromatherapy can fulfill your need for creativity, provide endless learning about health, and deliver endless fun with fragrance. Do it - for the smell of it!

Making the Spring GroomOgram Work for You

There are those clients who stubbornly refuse to make appointments over the winter and wait until spring for a grooming. Try to get them to book an appointment before Easter and warm weather rush. Send a GOG in March, and you will get a good response. All the client usually needs is a "whiff of spring air" and a GOG to get them calling.

Old English, Cocker, Westie and Scottie owners are notorious for waiting until summer for grooming. Send them a GroomOgram, and you should push a lot of them in, too, while you're not quite as busy. Plus, you will save yourself a lot of dematting and tick removal.

Spring-y idea! One groomer visits nursery schools in her area to put on short demonstrations on pet care. She gives each child a GOG and a little treat, such as a milk-bone for their pet, or a cookie made with the Kanine Kookie Kutters from Barkleigh Publications.

Wai Sam Hoi

2011 Up and Coming Groomer of the Year

he took a bowl full of love for dogs, put in a big scoop of raw talent, added a heaping cupful of the desire for perfection, and finished with a double measure of hard work. That's the recipe that Wai Sam Hoi followed to help her win the 2011 Barkleigh Honors

Award for Up and Coming Groomer of the Year.

"I want the dogs I groom to be perfect," said Sam emphatically. "I want them to look exactly like the breed standard."

Like many other groomers, Wai Sam Hoi (known to everyone as Sam), became interested in grooming



because of her own dogs. Unlike most of them, Sam's journey into grooming started far, far away.

"I was born in Malaysia," said Sam. "The pet industry in Malaysia is very different from the United States. When I was growing up, there were very few groomers.

"I came to the United States in 1999," said Sam. "I didn't know many people when I first came here, and I didn't know anyone in the grooming industry."

Sam's grasp of the English language was very limited, but that didn't stop her from pursuing her dream. Sam took college classes in New York to learn English. She also attended and graduated from the American Academy of Pet Grooming in New York City.

"When I began grooming school, it was very difficult for me to understand the teacher because of my limited understanding of the English language," said Sam. "It took me some time to learn, and I would have to ask a lot of questions, but I worked very hard and persisted until I understood fully what I was doing. After graduating, I began my career at a grooming salon in East Hanover, New Jersey.

"I returned to Malaysia in 2004 and opened up my own grooming salon," recalls Sam. "The grooming industry in Malaysia was just starting to grow in 2004. There were only three grooming salons in Ipoh, the city where I was located, and the only grooming competitions that I was aware of were in the really big cities like Kuala Lumpur."

After operating her salon successfully for two years, Sam returned to the United States to get some advanced training. She became certified with the National Dog Groomers Association of America, and she is presently working to become a Certified Master Groomer.

"I went to Delaware and studied under Terrier specialist Sarah Hawks," said Sam. "I wanted to

learn more about scissoring, breed profiles, and especially about hand-stripping."

Sam took a position at Dog Works by Sarah located in Newark, Delaware, where she began intensive training in all phases of grooming. Sam found that she really loved hand-stripping, and it soon became her specialty.

In 2010, Sam decided to try

her hand at competitive grooming. She entered the Terrier Tournament at *Groom Expo* in Hershey, Pennsylvania. Although she was very nervous, Sam was also excited to be entered in the competition. She hand-stripped a Sealyham Terrier, and her efforts rewarded her with a second place finish in the Level 1 division.

Sam was hooked. She loved the excitement of the competition, the critique by the judges, and the applause of the audience. Most of all, she made it her mission to transform the dog on the table before her into perfection.

After her *Groom Expo* victory, she entered the *Fun in the Sun* competition in Florida and won first place in the hand-stripped Terrier Class, second place in the Mixed Breed Class, and second place in the Poodle Class. She was declared Best All Around Groomer in the C division.

"I love competing so much," shared Sam. "I learn something every time I enter the ring. I can see how much I have advanced in my skills. I am always striving to better myself."

Sharing in Sam's excitement and accomplishments is her husband, Richard. "Although my husband is not involved in the grooming industry, he is very supportive of me," said Sam. "He helped me find the first grooming school that I attended. He supports me at many grooming competitions and helps me with the traveling and care of the dogs."

In 2011, Sam entered competitions at *Intergroom* and took first place in the Mixed Salon Styling Class in the Rising Star competition. She also competed at the *Atlanta Pet Fair* and took first place in the entry level of the Terrier Class. In Chicago at the *Atl American Grooming Show*, she took third in the Poodle Class, first in the Terrier Class, and first in All Other Purebred. At the *New England Pet Grooming Professionals SummerFest*, Sam won Best in Show and Best All Around Groomer.

She has appeared in the winners circle so often that she was nominated for one of the new *Barkleigh Honors Awards*: the *Up and Coming Groomer of the Year*. The awards banquet was held on Saturday evening during Groom Expo this past September. The ballroom of the *Hershey Lodge and Convention Center* was filled to capacity with pet

care professionals eagerly awaiting the presentation of the first-ever Barkleigh Honors Awards.

As each nominee for *Up and Coming Groomer of the Year* was announced, appreciative applause confirmed that the attendees approved of the nominee selection.

When Wai Sam Hoi was announced as the winner, squeals of delight and thunderous applause echoed throughout the hall. Excitedly, she made her way up on the stage to accept her award. Through tears of joy, she thanked everyone who helped make that day and that award possible. She especially thanked Sarah Hawks for her guidance and for sharing her handstripping techniques.

"The *Up and Coming Groomer* of the *Year* award has been a great achievement for me," said a beaming Sam. "It has motivated me to continue pushing myself to compete and to become the best groomer that I can possibly be!

"I plan to continue competing, and I hope to become a member of *GroomTeam USA*. Eventually, my dream is to open up my own grooming salon."

As for the continued growth in attendance at the show, Shelly stated, "If we see a significant growth in attendance again at this year's

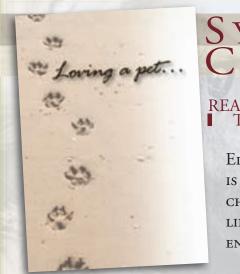
show, we are planning to add a day to the 2013 show."

The dogs that visit our salons L everyday may not be the breathtaking showstoppers that flamboyantly parade the show circuit, but as professional groomers, we should have a good understanding of basic anatomy and be able to recognize all of the breeds as they are intended to look (at least those common in our country). We should have a clear picture in our mind's eye of the relevant breed standard, even if we cannot exactly emulate the coifs seen in the show ring. These are simply pets - not show dogs. We can then adapt our skills for the average pets we service every day: our bread and butter clients. Once we can do this, we are truly professionals and at the top of our game.

There are many shortcuts, time-saving techniques, and tools used in the everyday application of our practice. Learn to use your tools effectively and practice different methods to achieve the best results.

Skimming the coat with a skip tooth #7 is an effective shortcut that can eliminate many minutes of blending time. Just be sure you always have one hand on the dog and that he is thoroughly fluffed and brushed.

Blending with thinning scissors is the best way to "erase" the lines from short coat to longer coat. Use thinning scissors to "bulk" thin up under the coat in the direction that it lays. This will help the coat to lay flat. Make one cut at a time and then comb and repeat. "Top" thin to blend the coat from the top. Use fine thinning scissors with more teeth, and trim on top of the coat in the direction that it grows.

Straight shears can also be used to blend the lines between long and short coat. For example, on the suburban trim for the cocker,

comb the skirt out and then use your scissors in a downward motion to blend from the short coat to the long coat.

For this sporty, easy maintenance trim, our goal is to achieve a natural, compact outline with a smooth back that blends naturally into fluffier legs without any distinct pattern lines. The pattern should look like it grows that way naturally, not like it is hung upon the dog like a curtain.

LENGTHS

The length of jacket, ears, topknot, skirt, and furnishings can vary according to the individual client's needs and requests. #5 or #7 on the back will leave a natural look; #10, short and smooth. Leaving a skirt is optional, but if left, it should be relatively short and follow the natural underline of the pet. Snap-on combs on the legs, followed

by a scissor finish and thinning shear blending, help to keep the trim simple. Leaving a slightly rounded crown that is well blended helps to keep the desired expression. For optimum results, operate the attachment comb on top of a #30 blade. However, #10 or #15 may also be used under the attachment.

PREPARATION

The Cocker has a water resistant coat that will require a thorough bath with a clarifying shampoo, followed by the application of conditioner and a meticulous rinse. The dense coat should be force dried to remove the excess moisture. Following up with fluff drying will help straighten the coat. Finish up the prep using #10 to clean the underwear area (sanitary), and then using #15 or #30, remove the hair from the pads.

Using an undercoat tool, such as a stripping knife, gently remove the excessive undercoat from the dog's back. Just a few minutes of stripping the excess undercoat from the back before clipping will help you avoid a corduroy pattern and aid in achieving a smooth, natural finish with your clippers.



Position yourself to the rear of the dog. With your free hand, gently stretch the loose skin just in front of the withers (collar area). Using a #7F (in this case), clip from the base of the neck back, following the natural hair growth pattern (Fig. 1 and directional diagram). Clip down the back and sides of the neck, falling off just below the shoulder and skimming to the elbow. Continue down the sides to just below the spring of rib (the widest point of the rib cage), skimming into the skirt coat (Fig. 2). Continue down the back, following the natural contour of the dog and falling off at the upper thigh. Using a "skimming" technique (the clipper is not in contact with the dog's structure but just the outermost layer of coat), skim down the rear leg to just above the hock. Continue to skim down the outside rear legs to the lower thigh (Fig. 3). Clip the tail.

Next, position yourself in front of the dog with his head facing you. Clip from the



























occipital bone down to the shoulders, following the contour of the neck under the ear to the chest (Fig. 4). Hint: using the breast bone as a guide, stop the clipper about two fingers above the bone.

THE HEAD

Switching to a #10, clip under the jaw and down the throat following the coat growth (Fig. 5). Remove the hair from the stop (between the eyes on the bridge of the nose) and the muzzle (Fig. 6). Clip from the corner of the eye toward the ear to remove the hair from the cheeks (Fig. 7). Clipping up against the coat growth, clip the ears to where the ear meets the skull (Fig. 8). Shave from the cheek to the inside of the ear (Fig. 9), which is called the ventilation strip. For particularly hairy ears, clip the entire inside of the ear (Fig. 10). Gently stretch the lips back and clip from the corner of the mouth toward the nose. Hint: Use caution to avoid the small fleshy bumps inside the lips (Fig. 11).



Using a snap-on comb, clip down the front and rear legs (Fig. 12 and 13). Be sure to back brush (brush upward and comb outward) and repeat clipping with the snap on comb ("A" over a #30 in this case).

Using short curved shears (inverted so the curve is toward the dog) and working from rear to front, set the "tuck up" slightly forward of the genitals on a male dog, where they would be if it is a female (Fig. 14). In the reverse direction, meet your initial line (Fig. 15). Next, follow the natural undercarriage all the way between the front legs, curving gently up toward the fore chest (Fig. 16).

Blend the side coat to the skirt (Fig. 17) and the shoulders and hips (Fig. 18). Use long straight shears or super blenders to tidy up the stray hairs on the legs, skirt, and between the front legs (Fig. 19). Use long curved scissors placed on a 45-degree angle to round the feet and long straight scissors to finish the legs (Fig. 20).















THE HEAD

For a rounded top skull, use a 7f to blend from the front fold of the ear back to the occipital bone, leaving the coat on the crown slightly longer (Fig. 21). Use a stripping knife to remove excess undercoat, and blend the top knot to the shaved areas around the top of the ear and cheek (Fig. 22). Use coarse thinning scissors to bulk thin under

the coat (Fig. 23) and fine thinning scissors to blend (top thin) the edges (Fig. 24). Finish the trim by tidying up the edges of the ear and the longer furnishings in a slightly circular shape (Fig. 25).

We hear a lot about breed standards, and it is important for every professional groomer to study and understand breed standards so that they may offer their clients correct breed profile recommendations. With that said, it is not just the technique used, such as handstripping, that is important. As professionals we should be capable of adapting the breed standard to pet grooming for our clients. Using a clipper instead of hand-stripping, or trimming the legs and skirt instead of leaving a long and flowing coat, allows us to adapt to our pet clients. This does not mean that we disregard the breed standard. With the American Cocker, for example, we are still looking for the slightly sloping top line, rounded top skull, proper angulation with parallel lines, and an overall look that is cohesive to this breed. This adaptation is not only important but also separates the professionals from the amateurs. It helps keep our bread and butter clients coming back and recommending us to their friends.

Study Proves Happy Hoodies Reduces the Level of Noise a Dog Hears

The creators of Happy Hoodie recently had Animal Audiologist, Dr. Peter M. Scheifele MDr, PhD LCDR, test Happy Hoodie to see if it reduced the noise level a dog hears while being force dried. They found that the high-velocity dryer does not produce a dangerous level of noise for dogs. A dog's hearing is compromised at higher frequencies than a human's. A force dryer, and the noise of the air that hits a solid mass, have a lower to mid-range frequency. During the drying process, frequencies can be reached that are uncomfortable for a dog. However, based on Dr. Scheifele's research, it is highly unlikely a dog would suffer noise induced hearing loss from force drying. The research did determine that Happy Hoodie does reduce the level of noise a dog hears by 5 decibels in situations where the frequency was at 3150 Hz and as much as 17 decibels at higher frequencies.
